### 4<sup>th</sup> OF JULY WEEKEND COMING SOON

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Annual Membership Dues for the fiscal year 2010/2011 shall be set at \$1,020.00 per funstead.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That \$32.52 per funstead of the Annual Membership Dues shall be designated for the Reserve Fund, \$3.15 be designated for the Vehicle Replacement & Maintenance Fund, and \$180.00 be designated for PO River.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this increase of \$120.00 per funstead in the annual membership dues are broken down as follows: \$112.00 increase due to PO River Water & Sewer Service to IACT's amenities, and \$8.00 increase in the Operating Budget.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, That this Resolution be approved as an Emergency.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE-BUDGET CASH CARRYOVER**-Property Owners who are getting misleading information concerning last year's budget as it relates to the Depreciation value of IACT's equipment (includes vehicles, furniture and fixtures, land and buildings of \$66,874 which is not cash on hand and the carryover surplus of cash on hand of \$53,000 which was placed in the Contingency Fund. We ask that you come in and go through this particular part of the Budget with IACT's Treasurer. It's easy for members to be confused when they are receiving conflicting information delivered for the sole purpose of misleading owners for personal gains. For some time now a "so called" group, calling themselves grassroots owners to save Indian Acres has been trying to take over the Board and run IACT and enact policies that can make IACT lose its Charter. One of the most devastating moves would be to try and change IACT's non-profit status in order to open up IACT for functions for profit and renting lots and trailers for overnight rentals. This goes against our Charter because IACT was registered and incorporated as a Private Recreational Camping Community.

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# IACT SECURITY DEPARTMENT

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**Vehicle Registrations begin April 1, 2011.** Safety Rules & Regulations are available for all listed vehicles at the Security Office.

All ATV's, dirt bikes and fun carts must be registered annually. Golf carts are registered on a one-time basis. Vehicles are to be inspected and registered by the IACT Security Department, the cost is \$5.00. All golf carts must have a rear view mirror and working front and rear lights. All golf carts, ATV's, dirt bikes, fun carts and dune buggies must have the Glen & Lot numbers displayed on the front & back of the vehicle, **PRIOR TO REGISTRATION**. Numbers must be a minimum of 3 inches in height, per Board Resolution dated April 22, 2006.

The IACT Security Department will issue tickets to any Property Owner that does not adhere to the regulations. The fine will be \$25.00 for the first violation & \$50.00 for each additional violation. Registrations and inspections are done every day between 9am and 4pm.

## NO REGISTRATIONS ON HOLIDAY WEEKENDS

**UPDATE YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION**-It is imperative that your contact information be current. The Security Department must be able to contact Property Owners anytime there is an incident on their lot. During the last snowstorm, numerous Property Owners had to be contacted by mail because their phone numbers and emergency contact numbers were invalid. Contacting by mail is a time consuming process and may result in more damage to your property due to the delay. The next time you are at the Acres, stop by the Administration Office or call 540-582-6314 to make sure your information is up to date and provide us your email address.

**LOCK UP YOUR BELONGINGS**-You have no idea how many times Security hears, "I was only gone for 15 minutes". An open shed door or trailer is irresistible to not only criminals, but also our furry woodland creatures.

**GUEST PASS BOOKS:** Please note that **ONLY YOU**, the **PROPERTY OWNER** are authorized to sign your assigned guest passes. Also, all guest passes are to be written in ink.

## PROTECT YOUR PROPERTY

To all Property Owners, write down all serial numbers of TV's, Stereos, DVD Players, HD Players, Play Stations and any item that may have a serial number. Also, protect your property, invest in an outside security camera.

Per the Declaration of Restrictions (item 8 Paragraph A, sub, Paragraph 9) overnight parking of any commercial vehicles is prohibited at Indian Acres.

## PLEASE BE SAFE-MEMO FROM COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Recently a woman saw an infant car seat on the side of the road with a blanket draped over it. She **DID NOT STOP**, but when she arrived home, she called the PD and was told several things to be aware of. Gangs and thieves are now plotting different ways to get a person to stop their vehicle. There is a gang initiation reported by the local police department that gangs are placing a car seat by the road with a fake baby in it, waiting for a woman, of course, to stop and check on the baby. Note, that the location of this seat will usually be beside a wooded or grassy (field) area and the person (woman) will be dragged into the woods, beaten and molested, usually left for dead. **DO NOT STOP. Dial 911 and report what you saw!!!**

If you are driving at night and eggs are thrown at your windshield. **DO NOT TURN ON YOUR WINDSHIELD WIPERS** and **DO NOT SPRAY ANY WATER** on it because

eggs mixed with water becomes milky and you will not be able to see. You then are forced to stop beside the road and become a victim of thieves. This is a new technique used by gangs.

Inform your family members and friends. These are desperate times and these unsavory individuals will take desperate measures to get what they want. Please be safe and never stop your vehicle.

## **MESSAGE TO ALL IACT PROPERTY OWNERS**

We have noticed that the majority of vandalisms which takes place in and around our Campground takes place on the Holiday Weekends when we have an abundance of guest(s) on site. Our Maintenance/Custodial Departments have worked hard fixing up our Campground and Comfort Stations. The weekend of 21<sup>st</sup> of May, the following Comfort Stations were vandalized:

- 2B-Broken windows
- 2C-Holes punched in walls, partitions torn down
- 14A-Feces smeared on walls
- 14C-Mirrors broken, screens torn out and feces in the shower
- 13B-Outside lights busted out
- 3-Soap dispensers torn from wall and destroyed, liquid in dispensers poured on floor, punched holes in wall, tore down shower curtains

Over the Memorial Day Weekend, the following Comfort Stations were vandalized:

- 2C-Was hit again
- 17A-Holes knocked in the walls
- 6B-Rods torn down on ladies side
- 14B-Holes knocked in the walls

These weekends are becoming very costly. It's expensive to repair the damage done to most of these Comfort Stations. New fixtures have to be obtained and installed, walls, torn down rods, broken mirrors and broken windows have to be purchased and installed. On many occasions, some of these Comfort Stations have to be closed. Time spent on repairs and putting these Comfort Stations back in operation could well be spent working on other areas in need around our Campground.

Property Owners are asked to monitor their guest(s) and children to insure that they understand the consequences of being caught vandalizing IACT property.

A reward is being offered to anyone who can identify the culprits, as they will be prosecuted. Owners are asked to be on the alert. Take numbers from golf carts and call Security 540-582-5532 when you witness acts of vandalism.

We ask you to be on the lookout for motorbikes and golf carts that trash the area leading off the Golf Course (Glen 11) behind the Swimming Pools and the Recreation Center. Try to identify the golf carts and/or motorbikes by numbers affixed to the vehicles and then immediately call the IACT Security Department. We can only reduce these acts of vandalism with your help. These acts are costing all of us as owners.

The breaking of Bread consisted of chicken, lettuce, olives, three bean salad, watermelon, crackers and lemonade. Bottle water was also provided.

Chad Brown, President welcomed those in attendance and stressed that he too was remembering his mother and father. The service, different this year, had no speakers or music. Mr. Goins rendered a song entitled "Jesus." He did a magnificent job officiating. Due to the threat of a rainstorm, the candlelight portion of the service was suspended.

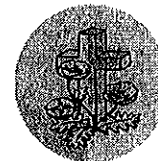

## HOUSE BILL 1975-Alcoholic Beverage Control; Banquet Licenses; Exception

*Provided that no banquet license shall be required for private meeting or private parties limited in attendance to members and guests of a common interest community provided that the alcoholic beverage shall not be sold or charged for in anyway.*

For the duration of this Summer Camping Season, the Association will run the IACT Clubhouse/Bar. This rule was placed in force again because on many occasions there are delinquent and barred members enjoying the same amenities that current members are paying to enjoy. Therefore, it's not fair for those who are current in their dues and other assessments.

**GOOD EATING IN SEPTEMBER**-At the close of the Summer Season, there's talk of having a corn roast. All of the IACT owners will be asked to participate. Actually, it can become a corn cook-off. There are many various ways of cooking corn. There's baked corn, roasted corn, boiled corn, fried corn, corn chowder, corn pudding and corn soup. Sounds like a good way to get all together and close out the Sumer Camping Season. If this sounds interesting to you, send in your suggestions to the Editor, or drop off your suggestions to the clerk in the Administrative Office.

Any number of IACT Property Owners has asked why owners and their guest(s) have to show their identification and IACT owners pass to enter the Clubhouse/Bar.

This was and is a requirement as spelled out in our Governing Documents. It was a standard practice in the early 90's, owners respected the rules and did not go out of their way to violate the "delinquency clause." The IACT By-Laws, Article IV COMMON AREA, Section 2 reads, "a delinquent member has only the right of direct ingress and egress only to his/her lot to the absolute exclusion of the use and enjoyment of the facilities and services of the Association."

It further stated that a delinquent member shall not be entitled to guest privileges nor shall a delinquent member be a guest of a member if the intent or effect in so doing shall be an invasion of these By-Laws or the Rules & Regulations of the Association.

**ARTICLE 11-MEMBERSHIP-SECTION 1**

The obligation of members to pay annual charges or other assessments set by the Association runs with ownership of a lot. Failure to pay such annual charge or assessment makes such a member a delinquent member whose voting rights and rights to use and enjoyment of facilities and service of the Association are suspended as long as such charge remains unpaid.

The problem is that too many owners are taking advantage of being delinquent. They party on other owners lots, they use the facilities, Clubhouse/Bar and Restaurant, the play areas and Swimming Pools. This isn't fair to the dues paying members who struggle to keep their accounts current. It sets a bad example if the Association doesn't demand strict compliance to this rule.

For Property Owners' convenience, we offer any number of plans by which owners can use to keep current in their dues. This includes the four (4)-payment plan and the dues arrangement plan by which owners pay throughout the year, a pledged amount to keep on the roll as paying owners on a plan by which the total amount of dues for a given year is paid up by the 30<sup>th</sup> of May of the dues year. The Board urges all owners to contact the President for payment arrangements.

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Here is where it happened-More Americans died in the Civil War than in all of America's other wars combined. From the French and Indian wars of the 1750's to the present (excluding the Civil War) about 615,000 American soldiers died in the line of duty in the Civil War along with more than 618,000 who perished in four years of fighting. One hundred thousand casualties occurred within 20 miles of Indian Acres in four of the greatest battles of the Civil War. Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Wilderness and Spotsylvania Courthouse. If you get tired of working on your campsite, why not take a "history break" and explore the fascinating Virginia neighborhood?

Battle of Spotsylvania Courthouse-Confederate General Robert E Lee had just defeated Union General Ulysses S. Grant at the battle of the Wilderness. Instead of retreating after defeat as previous Union Armies had done, Grant moved around Lee's fight flank to attack again. Both Armies marched all night and met again at the Spotsylvania Courthouse on country crossroads with no major importance except that federal possession would endanger the Confederate line of communications to Richmond.

# WHAT'S ON YOUR MIND?

**DECLARATION OF RESTRICTIONS-**The Declaration of Restrictions applicable to Indian Acres proscribes the use of an Indian Acres lot as a RESIDENCE. Indian Acres is a 365 year round campground with a summer & winter season. It is up to the IACT Board of Directors to come up with a definition of many of the terms used which applies to RESIDENCE. The definition given by a sitting Board in 1994 was a 5 day 14 continuous week rule.

A breach of the rule constitutes a clear violation of the residency rule. Facts upon which the committee could base its decision include:

- \* Does the owner maintain a home elsewhere?
- \* Does he/she own or rent a dwelling? If he/she rents or leases, is the cost indicative of true residence or a subterfuge?
- \* Where does he/she vote? When last voted?
- \* How much time does he/she sleep at Indian Acres?
- \* Does the applicant/owner take advantage of any Spotsylvania facilities such as schools or welfare facilities or plans?
- \* Many other similar questions may come to mind, which may be evidence of fact or intent with reference to intent.

Temporary occupation does not constitute residency. The Court held that resident is not vitiated by temporary departure where the intent to return exist. Another stated that whenever a person voluntarily takes up abode in a given place without present intention to move constitutes residency and remains despite temporary absences.

The IACT Board of Directors and the Site Control Committee will meet to review the above. The Board may make additions and/or deletions to the residency rule. It is up to the Site Control Committee to carry out the decisions of the IACT Board of Directors as it relates to the rule on residency.

## RESIDENCY-COURT ACTION

Following being found guilty of residency by the Site Control Committee, the legal process must be put in place. Attorney William Glover usually takes charge of the residency cases once authorized by the IACT Board of Directors. The process includes the following:

- \* Meeting between lawyer & client (IACT-Site Control) to review the records of the owner claimed to be a resident
- \* Meeting with the owner claimed to be a resident
- \* Lawyer files with the court, to hold a hearing on "Residency Claim"
- \* Hearing is set by the court

Once placed on the court's docket, all parties will be identified. All parties involved will have to be prepared to present its case. IACT usually asks, in its plea, that the defendant(s) be made to pay IACT 's court cost and attorney fees.

At the conclusion of the case, if the defendant is found guilty, the Judge may require that the defendant remove themselves from the Campground, along with their camper. Or he/she may require that the defendant only be allowed to camp for a certain period of time then depart the Campground until a certain time of the year removing his/her possessions including trailer from the site.

This process from beginning to end isn't easy and it takes time for the process to work its way from the Site Control Office to the Lawyers office and then eventually to court.

# PROPERTY OWNERS INFORMATION MEETING

## HELD SATURDAY, JUNE 4<sup>TH</sup>

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Following a letter sent to all Property Owners by Lillian Cooper-Wiggins, Chairman, IACT Board of Directors and Chad Brown, President of operations, Indian Acres Club of Thornburg, 165 Owners registered and attended the meeting which was held on Saturday, June 4<sup>th</sup> 2011 in the Adult Clubhouse.

The intent of the meeting, as explained by the Chair, was to inform the owners, new and old, of the consequences of violating IACT's finances, Charter of Incorporation, the Declaration of Restrictions and the Non-Profit Status granted to IACT in the early seventies.

Recruited for the panel of speakers was Deputy Hammond from the Spotsylvania Sheriff's Office, Elaine Farmer, Auditor from Bowling Franklin & Company, Attorney Bill Glover who serves as a part-time sitting judge in the Spotsylvania County Courts and Tommy Lee, IACT's insurance agent.

The critical issues revolved around IACT's Budget (deficit in depreciation side of the audit-\$65,000) and the carryover of cash on hand (\$53,000). This \$53,000 was voted by the Board to be placed in the Contingency Fund. Mr. Kenyon Parker, Treasurer passed out two pages (4) back to back which showed how the amount of \$65,000 was derived at as a deficit due to depreciation of equipment and the savings derived from auditing of Board spending of \$53,000 which made up the carryover. Mr. Parker verified with Mrs. Farmer, that the Board was not mismanaging IACT funds and the allegations of mismanagement, overspending and theft of funds were misleading and unsubstantiated. Mr. Parker remarked that nowhere in the Audit can these allegations be proven and that owners have to beware of those who would "stir the pot" for political means. He cautioned owners not to "drink the Kool-Aid", meaning "don't believe everything you hear." The older generation remembers the Jones Town incident in which Profit Jim Jones got his followers to join him in Guyana South American having them believe that they would live a better life. When some began to disbelieve in him and his dreams of a better society and wanted to go home, he fooled them into drinking Kool-Aid, which ultimately leads to their demise.

Discussed at length was IACT's non-profit status. The Auditor explained that losing this status would not be in the best interest of IACT. That it was special and if lost, would probably not be regained. Presently, the Association only pays taxes on monies earned. Since IACT is a Private Recreational Membership Campground, there are certain restrictions attached which are reserved for members only as described in IACT's Governing Documents. In response to questions, the Auditor explained that the non-profit designation could be changed but she asked "would this be in the best interest of IACT?" Having activities, which would raise money, by holding pay events on the grounds of the Acres and renting trailers and unused lots would bring in funds, but she asked "would it be worth the risk of losing the present status?" This is something she said the Association and its membership would have to decide.

Would we benefit if we had to pay taxes on these monies raised from outside activities and could we afford to pay taxes for over one million dollars plus? Breaking the Charter to rent and open the Campground would require extra Security, the county, the state and its increased rules and regulations.

Electrical Breaks-An owner questioned whether or not she could file suit against the Association for electrical breaks occurring on her lot, which as she alluded to, was the fault of the Association. Many owners are insisting on using 50amps at the campsite when the entire area only holds 30amps. To increase voltage into lines that were meant to hold 50amps overloads the lines and they pop and cause electrical fires. It's was agreed upon that this is an issue that the Association would have to work on with professionals in the electrical field including the electric company. The attorney stated that he did not advocate trying to sue IACT.

The meeting ended up with the insurance representative explaining why IACT as well as other Associations needed insurance coverage.

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## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT, CHAD D. BROWN

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It was encouraging to see so many funsteaders attend the Informational Meeting of Property Owners on Saturday, June 4<sup>th</sup>. My goal, as well as that of the Chairman, was to bring questions of interest to the forefront for all owners to be involved. Presently it has only been the voices of a few misguided Property Owners that's been delivering misinformation. These owners go by groups and reportedly "move on organization." Which proclaim to want to "Save Indian Acres." My goal has been to work to advance our Campground as well as serve all owners of Indian Acres in the best way that I can.

I spend many hours here on the Campground solving and working on problems. It seems like the problems never end. Our facility is old and it seems like this is the year that everything is breaking down. Just in the last few weeks, we have had to solve some major infrastructure problems. One side of the wall in the Trapp Farm building has deteriorated and is being worked on as of this writing. Culvert pipes have to be placed in the small lake, Putt Putt Golf Course needs repairs and major repairs have to be done to several Comfort Stations.

Speaking about the Comfort Stations, I would ask that owners be more aware of what is going on in our Comfort Stations. Our guest(s) and perhaps some owners are destroying our Comfort Stations. It's expensive to make these continued repairs in our Comfort Stations. To stuff toilet paper and other items in the toilets will eventually lead to major repairs to the system. We only hurt ourselves when we destroy property that our dues have to pay for.

The Campground is beginning to look pleasing to the eye. With further attention, it's going to be attractive to the eyes of owners as well as new owners. We continue to work on identifying owners of abandoned lots and trailers with the county and to date we have cleaned several lots and have removed approximately 200 abandoned trailers. Letters have gone out to owners of abandoned and broken down trailers. This is no easy job. We have to follow the process and this takes times. We have to file documents and take the legal route. If we don't, we could open up ourselves for legal prosecution from an owner or family member of an owner.

Sorry Mr. Larry Pritchett, Treasurer of Spotsylvania County could not be at our meeting as he was to explain the process needed to remove trailers and other items from funsteads. He had a previous engagement. We hope to get him to address the funsteaders in the near future.

Our Swimming Pools are up and running. We have purchased new furniture and we have fixed up the children's playground off from the poolside.

Other improvements made to get the campground going for the Summer Camping Season includes: staining back deck of Clubhouse, painted playground equipment, painted several Comfort Stations, painted signs and Glen signs.

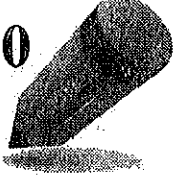
